Under New York state law, persons under the age of 21 cannot purchase or be served alcoholic beverages. The University requests that everyone conform to the letter of the law. Beer and wine are provided in the tents until midnight. There will be cash bars offering mixed drinks in the main tent on the field. Please note that law prohibits the possession and/or consumption of an open container of alcohol in public places and within vehicles, including vehicles driven by our student staff.
