At Colgate, students personally feel the support of faculty and staff who are invested in their future and alumni who are famous for their passion and willingness to help. Robust career development opportunities help students land the most competitive internships, jobs, and graduate and professional school admissions. THE APPROACH

Career support means building a relationship, not just building a résumé. This philosophy is at the heart of Colgate's four-year career development plan.

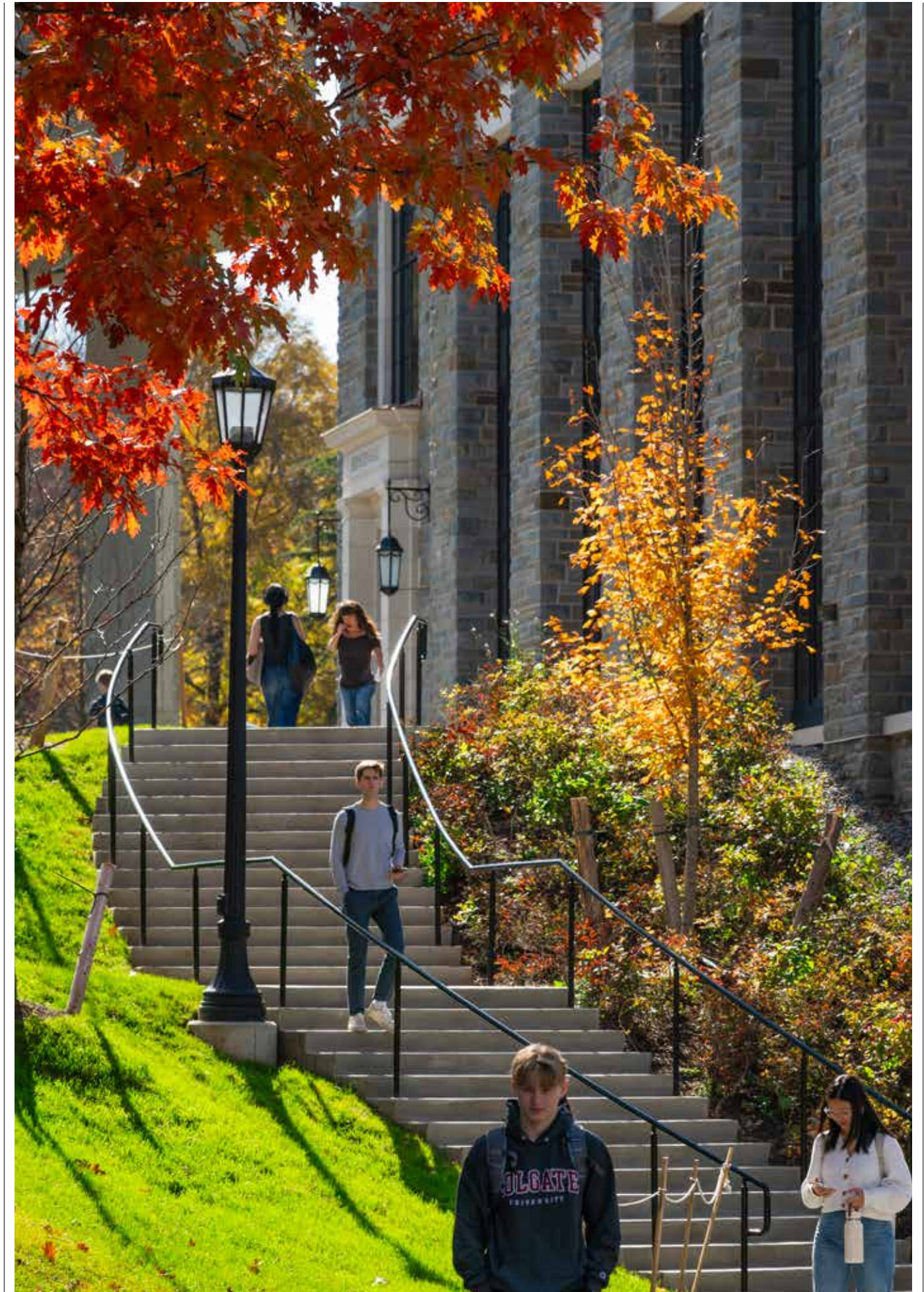
Colgate supports students as they find their way and their voice. The four-year career development plan engages students early, embeds support where they live and learn, and tailors the pathway to the individual.

Leveraging the expertise of a strong team of career services professionals, students engage in exploration, self-reflection, and action planning throughout their Colgate education.

This leads them to find a sense of direction and purpose while also building career readiness skills. They become empowered authors of their life choices. Students leverage robust resources to gain hands-on experiences. The plan grows each year, just as students do, adapting to what they need — while the support remains personal.

By partnering with students, Colgate makes this process and

development less stressful and more manageable, by guiding students on how and when to take certain steps — all with an eye to what employers, graduate schools, and professional schools expect. The entire University is committed to helping students know what questions to ask, where to get answers, and how to make smart choices that set them up for a full, successful life.



THE PATHWAY

Career Services orchestrates the four-year plan to help students build strength within seven essential career development areas.

First-years begin by cataloging their strengths, interests, values, and identities with career advisers, and exploring broad career areas through alumni-led panels and informational interviews. Students practice basic career skills, like writing a résumé.

Sophomores grow their awareness of industries and roles, working directly with a career adviser and participating in alumni programming, such as SophoMORE Connections. Developing networking skills and learning how to apply to internships helps students land a professional experience for the summer.

Reflecting on their first two years, **juniors** hone their interests and focus their efforts on pursuing a summer internship or research experience, often supported by alumni. Advisers coach students on strengthening interviewing and networking skills. Students take advantage of opportunities provided through ColgateX, such as Career Services' Microcredential Initiative, to build industry-based skills and knowledge.

Seniors focus on applying to graduate or professional schools, fellowships, and employment. Leveraging the knowledge and skills they built throughout their time at Colgate, they are poised to pursue and evaluate opportunities. With an eye for a fit with their academic and career interests and personal needs, students ultimately launch their postgraduate career with the confidence they acquired at Colgate.



ABILITY TO TELL ONE'S STORY

Begin to develop a strong sense of self that includes identity, strengths, interests, values, and the ability to communicate their story.

EXPLORATION

Conduct initial career exploration research and begin identifying areas of interest and career areas to rule out.

APPLICATION MATERIALS

Create strong application materials — résumés, cover letters, personal statements — that position oneself as a qualified and prepared applicant.

NETWORKING

Learn to connect with alumni and other professionals to explore interests. Strategically network to advance career goals.

INTERVIEWING

Practice telling one's story with an emphasis on communicating potential value for a desired opportunity.

ANALYZING

Reflect upon and evaluate one's self-knowledge, awareness of a chosen industry or academic area, and skills to narrow down a career direction. Consider how to pursue additional opportunities to increase one's competitiveness for a desired career outcome.

ACTION PLANNING

Activate and self-manage a plan to advance one's desired outcome. Learn to manage timelines of applications and offers ethically and professionally.

CAREER SERVICES

Colgate creates constant opportunities for students to understand how to connect their academic interests to a fulfilling career direction — one that leads them to potential internships, jobs, graduate school, or service. The place that orchestrates and integrates Colgate's four-year career development plan is Career Services, a hub of personalized help. Colgate's career team is larger than those of other liberal arts universities, which means more individual attention as students explore, prepare, and translate the liberal arts into a lifetime of meaningful work.

The Colgate community's commitment to students' career preparation is exemplified by Career Services' home: Benton Hall. This stunning \$16.4 million facility was 100% alumni- and parent-funded. Wired to match the connectivity of today's world, Benton Hall hums with in-person and virtual interactions between students, career advisers, alumni, and employers around the globe. Over 1,000 alumni and parents volunteer annually to participate in career exploration programming, internship or job recruiting, and mock interviews.

CORE CAREER SERVICES

Career advising: Individual sessions with professional staff to identify the traits, interests, strengths, identities, and values unique to each student — and how they connect to career areas students can explore.

Industry-specific advising: Individual coaching sessions with professional advisers in which students learn how to initiate targeted searches toward a specific career or graduate school path.

Career search skills workshops: Interactive sessions that develop students' essential career-search skills (such as interviewing and résumé writing) and guide them to fully leverage Colgate's many resources.

Colgate Premier recruiting program: Nearly 200 employers from a diverse set of industries partner with Colgate annually to recruit students for internships and full-time employment. Employers engage through on-campus and virtual information sessions organized by Career Services.

Alumni- and employer-led sessions: Career exploration, networking, and industry-specific training sessions introduce students to career options, professional contacts, and core skills sought across industries.

Summer internship and graduate school grant programs: Through the generosity of alumni and family donors, Career Services' initiatives support students to pursue unpaid/underpaid internships and the process of applying to graduate school.

Colgate offers practical, hands-on learning in a variety of industries.



Colgate students have the rare opportunity to conduct research at the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, Md., one of the world's foremost institutions of health science and discovery. The experience involves 30+ hours of research each week in an NIH laboratory.

PREPARING FOR PROFESSIONAL SUCCESS

Employers, graduate schools, and professional schools expect candidates to complete at least two professional experiences before they apply during their senior year. This is why Colgate

places a priority on helping students gain practical, hands-on experience that equips them to be more competitive for postgraduate outcomes.

Health Sciences

Colgate students and alumni benefit from academic and health professions advising through the Health Sciences Advising Office. Students can train in the local ambulance corps as EMTs, shadow area physicians, conduct research with a faculty member, and apply to attend a full-semester study group at the National Institutes of Health.

Law

Colgate students can prepare to pursue a legal career by delving deeply into writing, research, and analysis-based courses within the liberal arts curriculum, joining one of the student organizations housed under Colgate's Speaking Union, and applying to be a Golden Fellow. Pre-law students and alumni have a dedicated pre-law adviser in Career Services to assist them throughout their planning.

Engineering

Colgate offers a 3-2 program with Columbia University, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, and Washington University in St. Louis. Students attend Colgate for three years, then, under the guidance of Colgate's pre-engineering adviser, transfer to an engineering school for two more — and earn a bachelor's degree from both. An additional year of study can lead to a master of science degree.

Architecture

Students can take advantage of an architectural studies emphasis in the Department of Art and Art History. A pre-architecture adviser within the department prepares students for graduate school and internships in the field.

TUCK BUSINESS BRIDGE PROGRAM

Offered in collaboration with Dartmouth College's Tuck School of Business, Colgate Career Services, and Colgate's Office of Entrepreneurship and Innovation, the Colgate-Tuck January Business Bridge Program is designed to prepare top liberal arts students to be successful candidates for internships and jobs. The program features a comprehensive curriculum taught by the school's top-ranked MBA faculty and includes a capstone team project and career exploration modules.

COLGATE'S MICROCREDENTIAL INITIATIVE

Career Services orchestrates high-impact mini-courses and seminars each semester and over winter and summer breaks to teach students professional skills, such as Adobe Creative Suite, Excel, Digital Marketing, Project Management, or SQL. These opportunities assist students in increasing their readiness and competitiveness for internship and postgraduate options.

and undergraduate research accessible. Colgate's alumni and parent donors generously provide funding to sponsor grants to help offset the costs of unpaid or underpaid internship experiences. And advisers in Career Services, along with Colgate's faculty, help students leverage Colgate's connections and navigate the entire process.

RESEARCH

A hallmark of a Colgate education is that undergraduates get to engage in graduate-level research with top faculty. Whether through a summer or academic-year research assistantship, or as a self-designed academic senior project, a majority of students take up the opportunity across the entire spectrum of the liberal arts, from the sciences to the arts and humanities.

This experience enhances the intellectual growth of students and gives them an advantage when competing for national fellowships, graduate and professional schools, and top job offers. Some students even publish and present their research before they graduate. These research opportunities reflect Colgate's distinctive scale as a university of world-class faculty in the setting of an intimate liberal arts college.

Throughout the year, Career Services hosts informal small group chats, information sessions, and interviews on campus as well as virtually, driven by leaders of some of the most

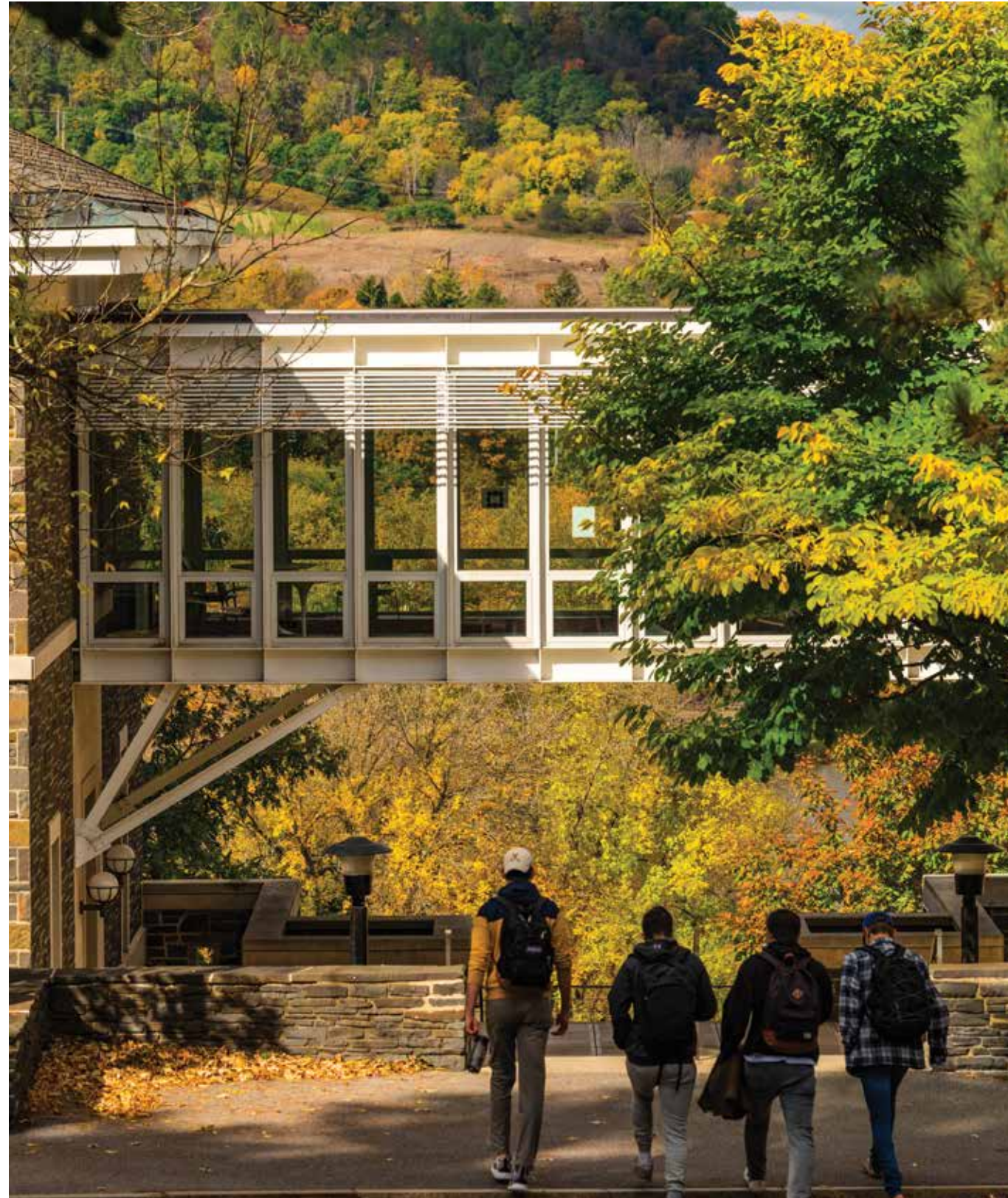

FELLOWSHIPS AND SCHOLARSHIPS



Fellowships and scholarships can be invaluable in shaping a career, forging connections, and providing coveted experiences that often come packaged with financial support. They are also deeply competitive. Students must have strong academics and civic engagement, awareness of the deadlines and requirements, and an understanding of which opportunities are right for

them. Colgate provides that clarity and support through its Office of National Fellowships and Scholarships, which helps students position themselves to apply and win. Colgate students and alumni have been awarded some of the most competitive fellowships and scholarships in the world.

John A. Golden '66 Fellowship:

This prestigious fellowship provides funding in addition to advising, programmatic, and financial support for students interested in pursuing law school or medical school.

Graduate School Access Fund (GSAF):

The GSAF provides advising and financial support for Colgate students from underrepresented backgrounds and

students with demonstrated financial need to seek admission to graduate schools and professional schools.

Jim P. Manzi '73 Fellowship:

Manzi Fellows receive a grant to offset their living and internship-related expenses while they work in nonprofit organizations in the greater Boston area.

ENTREPRENEURSHIP AND INNOVATION

Colgate attracts students with drive, curiosity, and ambition. This is the entrepreneurial mindset the University seeks. It applies from finance to the humanities, and it is a distinctive advantage for career success. That is why the University fosters it in every setting and every

opportunity. Colgate creates exciting chances for students to experiment, invent, and reach for big ideas. And it backs them up with professional development, dedicated spaces like Bernstein Hall, a loyal alumni network, and the opportunity to secure seed money for their ventures.

Cha'Gate, founded by Vivian Jiang '26 and Bill Luo '26, joined Colgate's Thought Into Action (TIA) program to bring bubble tea and Asian culture to campus. After participating in the TIA Summer Accelerator, the team gained essential business skills, tackled legal processes, and prepared for fall semester sales. With tools like a custom pushcart and plans to use the campus food truck, they aim to serve the community efficiently. Successful summer sales motivated them to expand, offering dietary-friendly options and sustainable merchandise.



The newly completed 25,700-square-foot Bernstein Hall stands as a hub of creativity and innovation. It offers flexible performance and teaching spaces, cutting-edge computer and media labs, vibrant studios, and welcoming gathering areas for faculty and students. Exhibition and performance venues showcase immersive and interactive works by artists, while two state-of-the-art fabrication labs provide hands-on learning opportunities that inspire exploration and ingenuity.



ALUMNI

Colgate alumni are known for their loyalty, accomplishments, and eagerness to connect today's students to the people and opportunities that can shape a career. At more than 35,000 strong, Colgate alumni are leaders of business, literature, finance, entertainment, and

more. Colgate grads provide mentoring, internships, and constant engagement with undergraduates, tailored right down to the students' areas of interest. In so many ways, alumni invest in the outcomes of students, just as their predecessors did for them.

Career Exploration Week

Career Exploration Week is a large-scale program featuring alumni in broad career panels aimed at first- and second-year students.

Alumni Career Conversations

Career Services matches hundreds of students each year with alumni for virtual informational interviews during winter break. Following orientation sessions in which students are trained on the basics of networking, students learn firsthand about potential career interests and hear how alumni connected their liberal arts education with their career opportunities.

Prep for Tech

Prep for Tech is a two-day interviewing boot camp for students interested in computer science, software engineering, and programming-related careers. Students learn what top technology employers expect from job candidates and how to be successful in technical and behavioral interviews.

SophoMORE Connections

Nationally recognized, SophoMORE Connections is a two-day career and academic discovery conference unique to Colgate. It is an immersive opportunity for students to engage alumni. And it is geared specifically toward the career topics and questions students should be considering in their second year. More than half of the sophomore class typically participates each year.

Michael J. Wolk '60 MD Conference on Medical Education

The conference centers around discussions of national and global health care experiences with topics that include neuroplasticity, critical care medicine, pediatric cardiology, and the U.S. health care system. Students informally connect with panelists to ask questions about majors, medical school, and day-to-day work culture.

Professional Networks

Colgate's professional networks, organized around interdisciplinary industries, make it easy for students and alumni to get and stay connected. Launched in 2013, the Colgate Professional Networks have become a nationally renowned example of alumni engagement and career

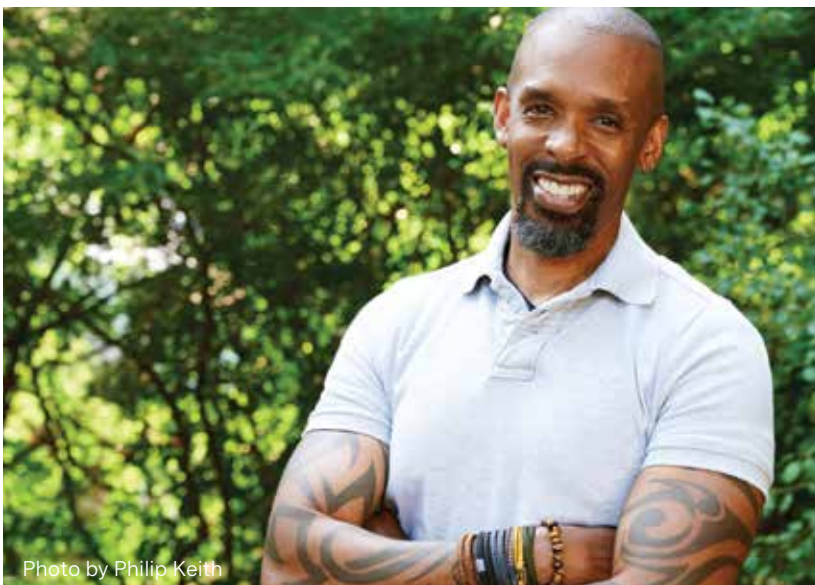

He works with several nations, including Kazakhstan, a former Soviet republic that inherited a nuclear test site and other facilities when the USSR collapsed.

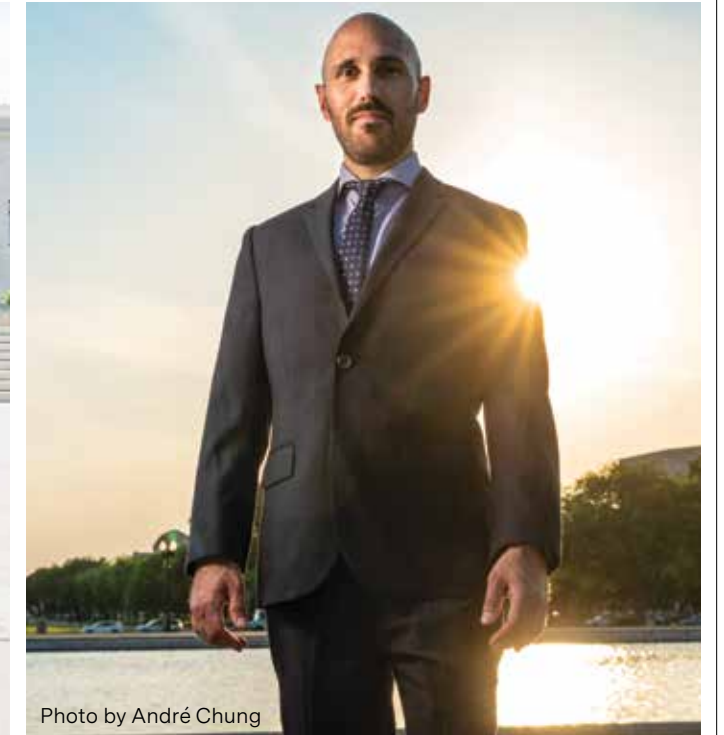

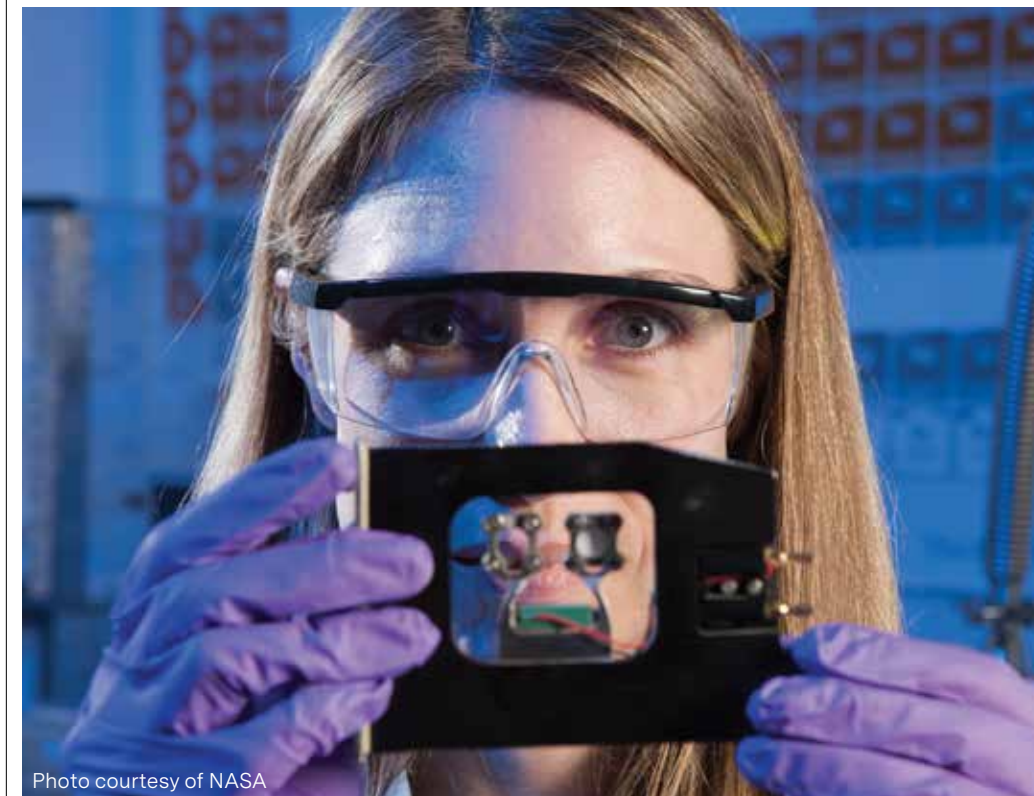

NASA, planetary scientist

Liz Rampe '05 is the deputy principal investigator for the chemistry and mineralogy instrument on NASA's Curiosity rover, which has been exploring Mars since 2012. She and her colleagues tell the instrument what to do and analyze its data. Rampe's fieldwork in Iceland complements the work she does with Mars samples. Curiosity is studying lake samples, so the specimens from Iceland might help Rampe's team better understand how subtle changes in water conditions affect mineral compositions.

The Third-Century Plan

A long-term framework to guide the University as it achieves the highest fulfillment of its mission.

The first-initiative highlights:

Making a Colgate education within reach for the best students from all economic backgrounds:

The Colgate Commitment eliminates or adjusts tuition based on a family's income level, significantly reducing student debt for eligible domestic students.

Expanding Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion:

A great institution is a diverse institution. Colgate embraces its obligation to welcome and support students of different socioeconomic backgrounds, races and ethnicities, and religions on campus.

Building on a multiyear effort to arrange our first- and second-year students in meaningful Residential Commons:

Colgate's Residential Commons system is grounded in the desire for every student to have a strong foundational community from the first day — a place where they experience tradition and build belonging.

The Robert Hung Ngai Ho Mind, Brain, and Behavior Initiative (MBBI):

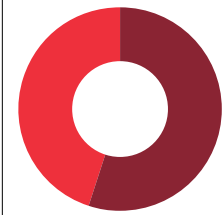

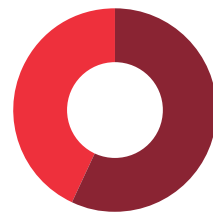
